We Graduate Brothers have a responsibility – a sacred Bond – to fight for the right for our Fraternity to exist on campuses. AXP is different than some other fraternities. We make a BIG deal out of academic achievement, and celebrate it every year with scholarship awards and recognitions of exceptional Chapters. We make a BIG deal out of community service and look for ways to boast about outstanding Chapters and lift them up as role models for other Chapters. We make a BIG deal out of expanding on campuses that match the ideals of Alpha Chi Rho; we are not a Fraternity that expands simply to expand. We want to be on campuses where we can "Be Men" and help others grow into that ideal. We want to be a Fraternity that meets the needs of the undergraduate Brother, recognizing that that commitment becomes an investment in our future, as well as the future of the Brother.
