Believe me when I say that with all that has transpired at Penn State over the last 10 months, the potential of losing the Chapter was the last thing I needed or wanted. During the summer we met with the borough manager, code officials and the police department and appealed the suspension notice with the agreement that we would develop and monitor a corrective action plan. We subsequently held a retreat with the office of Fraternity and Sorority Life on campus and hopefully are on our way to getting back into the good graces of the college and borough. This situation could have resulted in the closing of the Chapter had several alumni not become involved.

What I'd like to point out is that we are vulnerable if we do not care for the Fraternity and the Chapters. Through the efforts of many volunteers and the hard work from the staff, our Fraternity is doing well, but it could always be better. Progress is being made on many fronts; and if you've ever said I'll get involved later, I'm here to tell you that later is now. Get involved.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

In the 21st chapter of the New Testament Book of Revelation, the One sitting on the throne declares "Behold, I make all things new." In the halls of academia, there is always that sense of newness in September. At least, that sense exists in the classrooms of college campuses. What about in your Chapter house or your Chapter meeting space?

Some Chapters of our Fraternity have developed bad habits over the years and even after a summer break, come back to campus to recreate those habits, thinking that is the normal way to do things in Alpha Chi Rho. In spite of all the information and warnings that the National staff has shared with Chapters,



alcohol abuse continues to be a problem in some of our Chapters. In spite of legal prohibitions, hazing continues as a regular practice in some Chapters. In spite of our revered Landmarks, there are Chapters where Brothers speak ill of other Brothers. None of these is normal for an Alpha Chi Rho Chapter or an Alpha Chi Rho man.

If you see yourself, or your Chapter, in any of the previous words, make this fall a chance to do something new. Make a commitment to your Chapter that when you say "Once a Crow, always a Crow!" it means something more than a semester of commitment, or a few years of commitment. When a disgruntled alumni Brother, upset over behaviors of the past, finds out that his Chapter is engaged in an intentional program of improvement, he will realize that "...always a Crow" pertains to him once again. When your Chapter works at creating an atmosphere of true Brotherhood and concern for each other, rather than being just a party place, it creates a welcome not just for today, but for the future as well.

One of the commonalities of all the world religions is the celebration of the human dignity of each person on this earth. Christian, Jew, Muslim – all seek to find ways to celebrate the gifts and talents of each person and find ways to use those gifts and talents for the improvement of all humanity. Our Fraternity was founded within religious ideals, ideals that through the years have transcended one denomination and have found ways to make our Fraternity open and welcoming to all men who see the potential of being an Alpha Chi Rho man. We see beyond the outer, superficial aspects of men and look into their hearts and very souls to build the bonds of Brotherhood that have kept us going since1895.

One of the definitions of insanity is "doing the same thing over and over again and expecting different results." This fall may be a good time for your Chapter to examine itself and see if there are some things that could be changed – changed for the better. Is it time to make some things new in your Chapter?

A VIEW FROM THE ROAD

As I spent my final few hours at headquarters before I hit the road for the fall semester, I tried to think of everything I might need to take with me. This actually turned out to be a difficult task because I wanted to keep the luggage to a minimum, but also ensure that I had everything that I needed. It was at this point that a slight nervousness settled over me, the likes of which I have never

felt before. Every year, school had always been a constant in my life and there were always aspects of this life that I could always count on to be there. This year was different, however, since I would be starting this new chapter of my life where I would be living out of my car. I had a mix of emotions that ranged from excitement, all the way to apprehension. After walking through headquarters for the fiftieth time and thinking of every possible scenario I might encounter on the road, I decided it was time to begin this voyage and leave Neptune, New Jersey behind.

I headed out to York College of Pennsylvania for my very first visit. The entire ride I was feeling very antsy because I had no idea what to expect. As I arrived at my destination, I was immediately greeted by some of the Brothers and made to feel right at home. I met with the President of the Chapter and the school's Greek Advisor almost immediately upon my arrival and the men are in a great position to become one of the school's best Greek organizations. The experience I had at York was amazing and it was all because each and every Brother took the time to meet me individually and include me in their day-to-day activities.

After a very successful visit to York, I then headed off to Gettysburg College. I had never been to Gettysburg, so the history of the area was overwhelming. Just as at York, the men of Gettysburg were very receptive to me and included me in whatever activities they were participating in throughout the day. They have a much larger Chapter than York, so it took me a little bit longer to get to know the Brothers, but once again I had a great time. The Brothers are going through a time of transition, where they are getting themselves back on track, but the men are all committed and should emerge stronger than ever. The history of the AXP house was truly astounding; they have paintings on the walls that are decades old. As my time in Gettysburg came to an end, I was eager to see where my travels would lead me next, and also get out of the unbearable humidity of the region!

I headed for Shippensburg University as the next school on my list. According to my gps, I was less than a mile from my destination, but all I saw was farms for as far as my eye could see. I began to wonder if the school was disguised as a barn, or if I was just completely lost. Right when I was starting to feel a little panic settle in, a little town popped up out of nowhere! Once again, the men were very receptive to me and I had yet another great visit! The men are doing awesome in terms of academics, community service, and philanthropy. The Greek Advisor at the school had nothing but great things to say about the men. The only thing that these men were struggling with was ideas for recruitment. We worked hard over the course of my visit to formulate an aggressive recruitment plan and I am confident that the men of Shippensburg will be very successful in achieving our goals.

My next stop took me all the way over to Penn State. The ride to PSU was quite an experience. I traveled Route 74 and it felt like I was on a rollercoaster. As I traveled over the mountain pass, there were times

Needless to say, I came through unscathed and finally arrived in Happy Valley. Similar to Gettysburg, the history at the AXP Penn State house is truly amazing. The house was remarkably clean upon my arrival and I was impressed with the pride the men showed in keeping the house in top shape. My meeting with the Greek Advisor, Doctor Baker, was great and he seems very excited about the initiative the men are showing this semester. I was also in attendance for a BBQ rush event that was incredibly successful. At just this one event, the men had over 142 potential new members stop by the house!

The morning after the Penn State rush event, I headed for Lock Haven. As I got further along in my trip, I noticed that the mountains were growing much larger and the surrounding area was getting much more wooded. It was incredible to see the diversity of terrain that Pennsylvania has to offer, but also how quickly the terrain changes. The men of Lock Haven do not have an actual Chapter house, but they rent numerous off campus houses. The men here, just as all of the other schools, really made me feel welcome and I had another great visit. The men are doing great in terms of service and philanthropy and the school views them as leaders in these areas. The only issue that these men face is improving the overall GPA of the chapter. Throughout my visit, we came up with different tactics and incentives to see that this goal is reached. I now head back to Philadelphia for the next week and look forward to the challenges that await me!


